SERVITE DOMINUM IN TIMORE

Dom Barthe continues his explanation of the Mass reflecting on the “Collect,” the brief prayer which follows the *Gloria*. Of course, the Mass is a long series of prayers from beginning to end, but the Collect is one that ought to stand out. It is the first of the priestly prayers of the Roman Rite, the other two being the Secret prayer of the offertory and the last being the Post-Communion prayer. These three highlight that the Mass is not merely the prayer of the assembled people, but it is the prayer of Christ to the Father. The words of these three priestly prayers are most often addressed to the Father and always concluded with the invocation of the whole Trinity.

Starting with the Collect, and then proceeding into the rest of prayers of the Mass we should view the Mass as a glimpse into the inner dialogue of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This is made most clear during the Preface, Canon and *Pater Noster*. In their own way these prayers allow us to witness the words of intercession, consecration, and sacrificial offering which arise from the Heart of Christ to His beloved Father for the salvation of our souls. This is made possible not only because of how the prayers are composed, but also by the fact that the ordained priest is offering them *in persona Christi capitis* (in the person of Christ, the head). In other words, offering the Mass as the very prayer of Christ is not only a textual reality, but a sacramental grace we benefit from by the gift of the priesthood.

In the liturgy, we hear the priest chant *Oremus* while bowing his head to the cross prior to the Collect. This sign of reverence again makes clear that the cross is our point of reference; without the grace of the Cross, our prayers would be of no avail! While praying, he holds his hands in the *orans* posture: palms facing in, hands spread the width of the shoulders. This posture depicts an inner disposition of awe as he addresses God most high.

The priest prays in the plural “Let us pray,” “we beseech You.” This construction makes it clear that the priest is standing in Christ’s place as the head of Christ’s Body. Because we are all made members of the Body of Christ, the prayer we offer is both Christ’s prayer as well as our prayer who are united to Him by baptism.

The Collect and the two other priestly prayers are truly worth our reflection from a literary point of view as well. So many of these prayers have deep historical roots, even back to the time when Latin was first employed as a liturgical language. Dom Barthe explains that the style of these three priestly prayers is, “adapted to the particular artistic prose of the liturgy, with a rhythm, a vocabulary, and a taste that is sober and solemn.” This style is reminiscent of the style used by ancient Romans when addressing a superior or even the emperor. It acknowledges the excellence of the One being addressed, offers thanks and mentions a request with deference and humility.

In the composition of these prayers we can detect certain patterns which come from literary devices. Following these patterns adds to the sophistication and the formality of our prayer. After all, the whole Mass ought to render to God the very best and the most refined of what we have and are. These devices include antithesis (mentioning earthly concerns, while praying for heavenly needs), parallelism and balance, asyndeton, assonance, hyperbaton (the separation of a verb from its subject or a noun from its adjective). Chiasmus is also a device used in other places in the liturgy, such as the Canon; it occurs when a patterns begins and then repeats but in the inverted order. For example when topic A and B are mentioned first, but the prayer concludes by referring to topic B then A.

These elements of literary technique show a mastery of the Latin language which rivals the ancient pagans, thus demonstrating that our God is worthy of the highest exercise of all the arts, especially the literary arts. Even more than their literary merit, we must marvel at their theological content as well. We pray as we believe; by giving careful attention to the content of the prayer of the Church, our prayer can form us in the truth, that we might know God! -Fr. O’
