

Servite Dominum in Timore

Continuing our meditation on the parts of the Mass with Dom Barthe's book, <u>A Forest of Symbols</u>, today we consider the Kyrie. Like the introit, it too is sung by the choir as well as recited by the sacred ministers. Its origin in the liturgy derives from the form of litany whereby the ministers and people would liturgically "dialogue" in petition to God. The Kyrie is referred to as a stable part of the Mass even in the sixth century, but it retained the Greek language which was common to the liturgy in Rome during the third century. Thus, the Kyrie is one of the earliest ritual elements which demonstrates the Roman liturgy's nature to conserve the modes of prayer of previous generations, and to utilize more ancient elements to denote sacrality. The liturgy is not ours to innovate, but to pass on what we have received (1 Cor 11:23).

The Kyrie is prayed now in three sets of three, a method which gives reference to Holy Trinity: *Kyrie* three times for the Father, *Christe* three times for the Son, *Kyrie* three times for the Holy Spirit. This form also evokes for us our Lord's threefold instruction to "ask, seek, and knock." (Lk 11:9). Threefold, too is our sin: original sin, mortal sin and venial sin; so, threefold is our cry for mercy. Again, threefold is our moral defect: ignorance, fault, and penalty; fittingly, threefold is our invocation for healing.

But rather than allow sin to turn us inward and downcast, the "three three's" of the Kyrie can also give us a glimpse of the big picture of God's plan. We petition for mercy nine times, one for each choir of angels. Timeless too is this outcry for mercy: three for the time prior to God's law, three for the time when God's people served the Law of Moses, and three for us who live under the dispensation of grace. Moreover, our prayer for mercy is not a melancholic moment, but rather is a prayer founded upon the hope won for us in Christ. We should sing the Kyrie as a victorious anthem, made possible because of the Cross of Jesus. The use of Greek can help us to call to mind that upon our Lord's Cross was the *titulus* which displayed "King of the Jews" in the Greek language, as well as Latin and Hebrew.

Clearly, then the Kyrie has an intimate connection with the Cross of Christ. In fact, we must have this clear in our minds: the only reason we can sing "Lord, have mercy" with any realistic confidence is due to the Cross of Christ. The very drama of cross (the paschal mystery) is about to unfold really and sacramental before us on the altar. Mercy, therefore, is the fitting preparation for the Mass, but it is also one of the four principle ends of the Mass as well. The conquering of sin is what has drawn us to Christ, and now to witness this victory again is why we assemble anew. This victory is accomplished by means of sacrifice; thus, the Kyrie brings into focus the sacrificial nature of our act of worship. We believe that Christ is priest, altar and victim; we see the celebrant standing in Christ's place on behalf of the people. We feel our repentance stirred as we sing the Kyrie; we also experience the new hope that only the Cross can reveal. Ultimately then, the Kyrie is the privileged meeting point between our sincere need and God's gratuitous offer of heavenly glory. Focused together upon our Lord's cross, the Kyrie unites our voices in a victorious plea for forgiveness. ~Fr. O'Brien
