MEMORARE



Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thy intercession was left forsaken. Inspired with this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my mother; to thee I come; before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy clemency hear and answer me. Amen.

SERVITE DOMINUM IN TIMORE

We reach now the end of the Roman Canon in our reflections on the book A Forest of Symbols. Before moving on to the Our Father, Abbé Barthe reflects that the Canon should be seen as a whole even though it is clear that certain texts were added and others matured through the centuries. As early as St. Gregory the Great, this prayer was known as the unique expression of the sacramental consecration in the Latin (that is Roman) liturgy. Gregory taught that its theology was so accurate and its literary value so excellent that it might be attributed to a single author. We do know that the guidance of the Holy Spirit lead many of our ancestors in the faith to contribute to the formation of the Canon as we currently have it. While we cannot propose that it is an "inspired" text along the lines of the Sacred Scriptures, we can safely affirm that the text was "assisted" by the Holy Spirit, under the authority of the pope. The Canon forms, "the very heart of the incorruptible lex orandi of the Church of Peter." In other words, the text of the Canon has been, and still is, formative for the manner of prayer (liturgical and devotional) for the Catholic Church.

The Our Father follows the Roman Canon as a profound expression of priestly prayer; this moment is akin to the final prayer of Christ on the cross, "It is finished" (Jn 19:30). The *Pater Noster* is introduced to a new Christian at their baptism; it is prayed frequently in the divine office, and we can be certain that it had a prominent place in the Mass at least since the fourth century. As he introduces the prayer, the priest says, "we dare to say." This indicates that he prays in the name of the whole body, even though he chants the prayer alone. The priest chanting the *Pater* alone dates back at least to St. Gregory the Great, even though the practice varied among the ancient eastern liturgies. The ritual of the Mass allows for a further sign of the unity in prayer between priest and people while the *Pater* is chanted, namely, that the people add their voice at the words, "sed libera nos a malo."

If we were to align the moments of the Mass with the events of Christ's life, the Canon can be compared to the Last Supper, the carrying of the cross and our Lord's death, Barthe says. The *Pater, then,* is like to His burial following the sacrifice completed on the cross. With our Savior's burial in the eye of the mind, it is right for us to pray, "Thy will be done" and "Thy Kingdom come" as expressions of surrender and hope.

The *Pater* is the prayer we learn from Christ's own lips. So consider how perfect a prayer is it just before we approach Holy Communion. We pray, "forgive us our trespasses" preparing within ourselves a sinless heart to welcome our Lord in the Sacrament. We also pray for our daily bread. While this has clear implications for our bodily sustenance, we know that God can provide us much more. The Father of our eternal life gives us nothing less than the Bread of Life, His own Son.

By observing the our Father, and the Mass as a whole, we are learning to conform our prayer to Christ's own prayer! St. Gregory reflects, how can we truly say that the sacrifice of Christ has been offered at the Mass if the words of that prayer were merely of scholarly origin? But instead, we crown the prayer of the Church, ("assisted," and ancient as it is!) with the prayer that Christ taught. In this way, we can understand the *Pater* to be somewhat like a dogmatic rudder which gives stability and direction to the broader prayer of the Mass. The *Pater* makes it clear, once again, that what is occurring upon the altar is nothing short of a genuine oblation: the very sacrifice of Christ Himself!

After the *Pater*, the priest adds further requests in the "*Libera nos.*" In it he requests divine protection and invokes the great apostles. The conclusion is said aloud and is a fitting transition into the fraction which is the start of the Communion rite. ~Fr. O'Brien
